

Upon notice duly given under Arizona Revised Statutes, Section 38-431, et seq., as amended, the City Council of the City of Bullhead City held a Special Meeting on Tuesday, December 17, 2024, in the Council Chambers, 1255 Marina Blvd., Bullhead City, Arizona.

**CALL TO ORDER**

Mayor D’Amico called the special meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

**DISCUSSION ITEM(S)**

1. Discussion regarding the Cell Tower Service Survey and additional actions.

City Manager Cotter said this item is a follow-up from a previous workshop regarding cell tower service as requested by Council Member Lettman. He said they spoke about some of the sporadic services, primarily on the Parkway, but then the conversation expanded to other areas in the community that may be experiencing cell service issues. He said staff recently administered a survey regarding cell phone service, and said Assistant City Manager Pruitt will talk about the outcome of the survey, and then take questions from the Council and figure out the next steps going forward.

Assistant City Manager Pruitt gave a brief PowerPoint presentation showing the results of the survey. He said staff wanted to see what people’s opinions were in relation to cell phone service, particularly in the Bullhead Parkway area. He said the survey was open for approximately one month.

Assistant City Manager Pruitt said one of the questions asked citizens how aware they were of cell towers. He said the results show 67 percent of participants said they are very aware of cell towers, and 78 percent said they are aware of the towers. He said the follow-up question was how often the participants rely on cell service in their homes. He said the results showed that 98 percent of the participants rely on cell service in their homes.

Assistant City Manager Pruitt said another question was how often the participants rely on mobile cell service while driving or riding in a car. He said this was a critical question because some of the initial feedback was that cell service was not very good around the Parkway. He said the survey showed that approximately 95 percent of the participants said they either always or frequently rely on cell service while inside their vehicles.

Assistant City Manager Pruitt said the participants were asked if they believed the installation of new cell towers would improve the mobile network coverage in their neighborhood. He said 91 percent of the participants said additional cell towers would improve service to them. He said the participants were then asked how they felt about having a cell tower near their home. He said the results showed

that approximately 35 percent of the participants were very comfortable with a cell tower being placed near their home while only 13.75 percent of the participants were somewhat comfortable. He said approximately 34 percent of the participants felt neutral about a cell tower being located near their home, and approximately 8 percent of the participants were staunchly opposed to a cell tower being placed near their home. He said this may be because people are not sure what the tower would look like and what impact it would have on their property values.

Assistant City Manager Pruitt said they asked what the participant's primary concern was regarding cell towers in their area. He said they asked this question because they wanted to get a sense of those people who were opposed to cell towers. He said the results showed that 32 percent of the participants said they are concerned with the potential aesthetics and 13 percent are concerned about their property values. He said if the cell tower looks good and fits in well, it will not negatively impact the property values. He said the survey went on to ask if they would support the construction of new cell towers if they blended with the environment. He said the results showed that 84 percent of the participants answered affirmative. He said approximately 6.5 percent of the participants were still against it, while approximately 6 percent of the participants were unsure.

Assistant City Manager Pruitt said they asked the participants if they would support more cell towers being built in their area to improve mobile coverage. He said 89 percent of the participants said they would support this. He said the survey then went on to ask how important it is to them that mobile networks continue to improve even if it meant adding more towers. He said the results showed that 91 percent of the participants said it was important, and approximately 2 percent are opposed to adding any new cell towers. Assistant City Manager Pruitt said the survey then asks the participants to drop a pin on the map showing where they think cell services are bad, if they have had a bad experience with cell service, and where they think cell service can be improved. He said the survey showed that most of the pins were placed along the Parkway, but many pins were also shown south along the river.

City Manager Cotter said the presentation summarizes where they left off from the last workshop and asked if the Council had any questions.

Mayor D'Amico said there are a lot of good locations for new cell towers. He said the city has water towers and sewer facilities spread across the city. He said a good place to put a new cell tower would be where the larger water tower is on the Parkway. He suggested staff contact some companies and see who would be interested in putting in more cell towers. City Manager Cotter said one of staffs follow-ups would be to contact some consulting firms. He said the map is interesting because it showed that the problem is not specific to just the Parkway. He said one thought is to share the entire survey results with all the cell providers and inform them that they surveyed the public and believe there are problems with cell coverage, especially on the Parkway and to also let them know that the residents are asking for better cell service now. He said the towers can be placed on city owned land and/or privately owned land. He said no matter who owned the land, they would have to go through the same process. He said staff also thought they could take the survey results to all the cell providers and let them know that there is a real need in Bullhead City for them to improve their service.

Vice Mayor Alfonzo said he had Hughs Net and said they put a large dish on one of his outside walls. He said he has poor cell service, and said he loses the signal on windy days because the wind will make the dish vibrate. He said he switched to TWN's fiberoptic service and has not dropped a call since. He said during their last workshop it was stated that the towers service only a half mile radius

and said if this is the case, towers will be needed all over the city. He suggested staff look into finding a company that can provide better distance and range of service.

Council Member Newlin asked City Manager Cotter if he knew of any private property owners that are currently pursuing a cell phone tower on their property. City Manager Cotter said he believes that Laughlin Ranch is currently being pursued, and said the Planning and Zoning Department currently does not have any active applicants or applications for a cell tower.

Mayor D'Amico asked if anyone from the public wanted to speak on this item.

Scotty McClure said the city should not be involved with private business. He said he paid one dollar for his cell phone, and said he does not have any problems with his cell service.

It was the consensus of the Council that the survey results be mailed to each major cellular phone provider and ask them to look into adding additional cell towers in Bullhead City.

## 2. Discussion regarding 2025 Legislative Priorities.

City Manager Cotter said every year the Council and staff go over the annual legislative priorities so that everyone is on the same page, especially if a council member disagrees with the list or if a council member thinks something should be added to the list. He said the legislative session gets fast and furious and there are times when he, the mayor, and Assistant City Manager Pruitt will have to travel to Phoenix, sometimes multiple times during the legislative session. He said things may come up during the year and staff may have to come back to the Council because a new priority came up that the city should either support or oppose, and said this may not be the only time legislative priorities are talked about.

He said the 2025 legislative priorities are as follows:

Highway 95-City Manager Cotter said they are advocating for additional funds and have been talking about replacing the current lighting with LED lighting which would bring the electric cost way down. He said the city has always maintained the lights on Highway 95, but since staff are currently working with Schneider Electric, one of the things they would like to do long term is switch to LED lighting. He said if the state is not interested in that, the right turn lanes are the highest of all the priorities.

Hancock Road-City Manager Cotter said the RTC (Rural Transportation Council) put Hancock Road in for \$4 million to refurbish all of Hancock Road. He said that it might be part of a bigger package that they represent and present to the legislature for all the rural roads.

Water Act Advocacy-City Manager Cotter said they are still waiting for an answer regarding the \$300 million grant they applied for, and said it may require the mayor, Assistant City Manager Pruitt, Utilities Director Clark, or himself to travel to Boulder City, Phoenix, or Washington, D.C.

City Zoning-City Manager Cotter said there is a proposal that there be no zoning locally, and said they can strip control from cities and counties. He said if this happens, the city will have no control over zoning and could possibly have industrial businesses or hotels in areas that were zoned for homes only. He said instead of traveling to Phoenix, Assistant City Manager Pruitt could oppose this bill electronically.

Short Term Housing- City Manager Cotter said if short term housing, such as Airbnb, becomes a state issue, cities and counties will have no control over them. He said he does not know why they are trying to make short term housing a state issue.

Federal Land Swap- City Manager Cotter said this has been an issue since 2020. He said when President Trump was in office, he signed legislation that swapped the Princess Mountain Ranch for the land at Community Park. He said for whatever reason, the federal government has not found it within their will, authority, or power to get it done. He said he and the mayor think that President Trump will be very interested in knowing that in four years, not one thing has happened with the land swap.

Water Rights- City Manager Cotter said the city went after all the sovereign lands the city has leases on. He said there may be a few stragglers out there that the city does not lease, but the community might really enjoy having. He said staff will spend more time on it during the upcoming legislative session.

The Laughlin/Bullhead Airport- City Manager Cotter said the airport has been looking at a major project, and they are asking for millions of dollars. He said perhaps a partnership is needed between Bullhead City and Clark County, or a partnership between Bullhead City, Clark County, the State of Arizona, and the State of Nevada to help advocate for additional funding. He said the airport needs to be expanded so they can offer more flights and better service. He said they would like to have daily service, not just charters.

Affordable Housing- City Manager Cotter said affordable housing keeps coming back. He said he has argued over the last couple of years that Bullhead City has been just as aggressive as any community has been in the state to find ways to bring affordable housing to our community. He said most communities have this problem, and does not think this is a zoning issue. He said they will have to keep an eye on this at the state level to make sure there is not a shift in trying to make cities and counties do certain things with their zoning and housing that maybe the city is not interested in doing.

City Manager Cotter said there will probably be more bills introduced during the legislative session, and they will watch all the bills.

Assistant City Manager Pruitt said he is the registered lobbyist for the city. He said he meets with the League of Cities and Towns and all other city representatives on a weekly basis. He said they review all the bills and then share their thoughts and opinions. He said it is important to Bullhead City that the League of Arizona Cities and Towns fight for Bullhead City. He said in addition to that, there is a formal reporting system that any lobbyist can log into and register their position on particular bills. He said these are the ways that you can influence the legislators and then it is formally on record. He said this lets everyone know who the bill is important to and who they should respond to. He said our representatives already understand the city's position and how important the bill is to the city.

City Manager Cotter said some cities have paid lobbyists, but Bullhead City does not. He said Assistant City Manager Pruitt logs into a system that you have to be a lobbyist to get access to. He said he is not a "lobbyist" but an Assistant City Manager who has other jobs and duties. He said he is a lobbyist when he logs into the system. He said he must fill out quarterly reports stating that he did not spend money as a lobbyist. He said this is how the city essentially does it. He said the city is also a member of the Arizona League of Cities and Towns, and said they pay annual membership dues.

He said they are also lobbyists and represent all 91 cities and towns in Arizona. He said they advocate for local issues, local control, and city issues. He said the mayor also advocates for the city and said there are times when he must travel outside of Bullhead City or the State of Arizona. He said having the mayor act as a lobbyist does work better than hiring a paid lobbyist. He said he wanted to make sure all the council members understand the process that is in place and said it works very well. He said there is an item on tonight's agenda to approve the 2025 legislative priorities, and said he wanted to make sure everyone agreed on the priorities and understood them before the meeting. He asked the council members if they had any questions. There were no questions from the Council.



Jeremy Brunk from TWN gave a brief update on projects they are working on within the city.

Captain John Birks from the Salvation Army thanked everyone that donated to the Salvation Army kettle ringers. He said both Kiwanis Clubs participated last Saturday and approximately \$2,000 was raised. He thanked all the businesses that helped during the kettle ringing, and said they have raised approximately \$26,000 so far, and said their goal is to raise \$37,000.

Scotty McClure asked why Marina Boulevard is being shut down on December 23rd. He said the cement over the pavement by MALC needs to be fixed, and said he is not happy with the way the Utilities Department is fixing the streets after repairs have been made. He said the steel plate that is covering a manhole as you come off Baseline needs to be fixed.

Gary Genovese spoke about the Honey Baked Ham fundraiser they are holding for the Colorado River Historical Society and Museum.

Salvador Martinez said he attended the last council meeting and spoke about someone who is not picking up after their dog. He said he is not getting any help from animal control and said an employee told him they were not able to help due to lack of funding. He said the person is still not picking up

after their dog and said it is becoming a biohazard problem for some of the people that live close by. He said he showed pictures of the gentleman that is not picking up after his dog around the neighborhood and said he was told the man is a former or current employee of the fire department. He said he felt that the person was a fire fighter and that is the reason why the city will not help him. He asked what signs he needed to post, and asked if someone from the police department or animal control could help him identify the man that is not picking up after his dog.

Eva Genovese spoke about a bingo fundraising event that is going to be held for Mohave High School Thunder Voice Association.

### **MANAGER'S REPORT**

City Manager Cotter said he would like to comment on a few things that were said during open call to the public. He said Assistant City Manager Kajirwa spoke with Mr. Martinez last week after open call to the public. He said Assistant City Manager Pruitt is in attendance tonight, and said they could discuss the issue outside if they like. He said there are certain issues the city may or may not be able to resolve in an HOA. He said the city may be able to help the HOA install signs regarding trespassing and picking up after themselves, and said under no circumstances has the city ever told someone they will not respond to their neighborhood. He said they will gladly have animal control go to McCormick every day, and said he knows Police Chief Trebes never said they will not respond to certain neighborhoods. He said the rumor mill of the city is not enforcing something because of a fire department employee is ridiculous.

City Manager Cotter said Mr. McClure's complaint about Marina Boulevard is valid. He said the damage was caused by gas company Kinder Morgan. He said their subcontractor was testing a major gas line in the community, and said they found a hole and it blew a substantial piece of pipe. He said the public will be inconvenienced on December 22nd due to a major repair that is needed to a portion of Marina Boulevard. He said they are hoping to have the manhole located on Baseline repaired sometime next week.

### 1. North Pole Adventure

City Manager Cotter said the North Pole Adventure was an incredible community event and thanked everyone that attended. He thanked the Council for singing, and thanked Vice Mayor Alfonzo for bringing the song lyrics. He thanked Public Works Director Johnson and her staff, Dave Heath, Claire Adams, and the Recreation Department employees. Public Works Director Johnson thanked the Council for approving the event, all the sponsors, and the Recreation Department for their hard work.

### 2. Senior Enrichment Center

City Manager Cotter said the generator arrived at the Senior Enrichment Center, and said they are working on hooking it up to the power. He said Human Services Director Jeff Tipton and Senior Services Program Manager Kim Cool are currently working on a temporary location so that everything can get moved into the new facility. He said staff is discussing the possibility of temporarily moving the service while still providing meals and meal delivery while also providing a space for recreation activities.

### 3. Optimum Community Center

Public Works Director Johnson said the contractor finished paving the parking lot. She said the parking lot has been striped, and said some lighting has been installed. She said there are still a few punch list items the contractors are working on. She said the building was painted inside and out, new exterior windows have been installed, a new roof, air conditioning unit, and many other updates have been completed. She said the Recreation Department has been moved to the Optimum Center, and said they will begin programming on January 1st. She said there will be two new pickleball courts and said they will be shaded, lighted, and screened. She said they are working to demolish the current pickleball court and plan on raising the roof 18 feet.

9. Approve the 2025 legislative priorities and authorize Mayor D'Amico and City Manager Cotter and/or their designee(s) to advocate on behalf of the city on the legislative priorities and to travel to Phoenix or Washington D.C. as needed and within the approved budget. (City Manager Cotter)

City Manager Cotter said a workshop was held before the regular council meeting to discuss in detail the 2025 legislative priorities. He said the priorities are as follows: Highway 95 right hand turn lanes,

repaving Hancock Road, water infrastructure, short term housing rentals, local control of zoning, work with the federal government on the water infrastructure grant, and the land swap.

Mayor D'Amico asked if anyone from the public wanted to speak. No one spoke.


